The purpose of this resource is to equip the local president to understand the important role of leading the local church in Nazarene Missions International (NMI).

The role of the local NMI President is to promote NMI in the local church, in cooperation with the pastor as a voting member of the church board and lead the local NMI council.

• We believe there are five key areas of impact in which every church should participate regardless of their size, location, or language.

• These are the NMI Top Five Areas of Impact: Prayer, World Evangelism Fund, Alabaster Engaging Children and Youth, and Links.

• Focusing on these five areas of impact does not diminish other areas of NMI influence. These items are stepping-stones to deeper involvement in missions support through the Church of the Nazarene. They are a way to begin to become involved; they are easily understood, and we are striving for them to be adaptable in every culture. We aim for each church to participate in these five areas, and then adding additional areas of connection, to match the interests and needs of each local congregation or district.

The following awards are given to churches at the annual NC Mission District Advance. We encourage every local church to become a World Evangelism Church and a Missions Priority One Church.

World Evangelism Church

Churches that give at least 5.5% of their income to the World Evangelism Fund have met the minimum goal in their support of the global mission. These churches are the lifeblood of the Church of the Nazarene's mission to the nations.

Missions Priority One Church

Missions Priority One is a way to recognize if a church has embraced the Five Areas of Impact of Nazarene Missions International: Prayer, World Evangelism Fund, Alabaster, Engaging Children and Youth, and Links. Why do we give to the World Evangelism Fund?

World Evangelism Giving is the cornerstone of Nazarene Missions. This denominational fund (WEF) is the foundation for discovering, delivering, and resourcing our mission's organization around the world. Every Nazarene church participates in Nazarene Missions through their contributions to World Evangelism giving. World Evangelism giving is essential for Nazarene Missions initiatives to thrive.

Here are a few examples of ministries that the World Evangelism Fund makes possible through direct funding or the ministry network:

- Missionaries Regional ministries
- Christian literature and resources

What is the easiest way to pay World Evangelism Fund in full?

- Contributing weekly or monthly will help the church more easily reach its goal.

- Mark each contribution for the ending church year (for example, 2020-2021)

What is my church's goal for paying World Evangelism Fund in full?

The goal is to send least 5.5% of adjusted church income for the World Evangelism Fund, as verified by the Annual Pastor's Report submitted to the district in March.

What is the goal for overpaying World Evangelism Fund to reach Church of Excellence?

The goal is to send least 5.7% of adjusted church income or \$1,500 over goal for the World Evangelism Fund, as verified by the Annual Pastor's Report submitted in March

FAITH PROMISE – For more info and videos Click here: <u>https://nazarene.org/resources/faith-promise</u>

Faith Promise is a plan based on missions giving at systematic intervals rather than just twice a year. Through Faith Promise, People pray about the amount they should give for missions (over and above their tithe). The amount is often given weekly, biweekly, or monthly.

How to prepare and plan Faith Promise with your pastor and council:

a. Set the date and plan a Faith Promise emphasis.

b. Discuss your specific responsibilities for the Faith Promise emphasis.

c. Who will be the speaker? Who will book the speaker?

d. Length of Faith Promise emphasis: Saturday? Sunday morning only? Sunday morning & evening? Saturday night & Sunday morning?

e. Plan for special gatherings? Friday evening rally, Saturday men's breakfast, women's lunch, teen pizza party Saturday night?

Ask about a missions bulletin board, the church calendar, and how and when the deadlines are for submitting mission information for the Sunday morning church worship folder, church newsletter, or website.

Discuss the amount that needs to be raised for mission for the coming year, starting with the WEF (5.5%), special offerings, local NMI Council expenses, missionary speakers—both care and offerings.

LINKS

Links is a NMI top 5 area of impact and a strategic ministry 'linking' Nazarene missionaries and Nazarene churches through prayer, personal contact, and generous giving.

Global NMI assigns each District missionary families (Links) every 3 years. Missionaries can use gifts to help with their everyday needs, such as food, clothing, etc. Your NC NMI requests that you reach out to all of your Links missionaries, pray for them, and consider sending gifts for birthdays, anniversaries, and special holiday's, such as Christmas.

Sending gifts to your Links missionaries: To send cards directly, you will need to first email your Links missionary and ask them for their address. DEPUTATION (Deputation Page/ Deputation Secretary's email/ Deputation brochure)

The Church of the Nazarene funds its mission's enterprise, and supports missionary families, through the World Evangelism Fund (WEF), which is given by local churches around the world throughout the year.

Missionaries supplement this fund by traveling to their home country every few years to raise money for specific ministry needs and projects, as well as to share with churches what God is doing around the world and inspire greater involvement with God through missions.

What is a home assignment?

Most Nazarene missionaries visit their home country periodically to raise funds. These trips are called deputation, or home assignment. The money they raise pays for a variety of personal needs including medical expenses, home furnishing, transportation and special mission projects.

If and when you have a missionary come to your church for a deputation or Faith Promise service, here are a few things to remember while hosting:

Imagine having a Thanksgiving dinner every day for three months. Furlough fat is the fate of missionaries. Taking care of special church guests requires healthy hospitality.

When family comes to our house on vacation, we spoil and indulge them. We stay up late chatting or playing games. We go to the mall to shop for the upcoming family event. It is a break from their routine, a pleasure trip.

For many missionaries, however, travel is their job. They need a different type of caring. This thoughtfulness manifests itself in three fundamental areas: food, sleep and free time.

Potlucks can be challenging places for anyone who has to be careful about his or her health. People are emotionally invested in the food they bring. They want to prepare food the missionary will be talking about years later. They also do not want anyone to go away hungry. There seems to be no graceful way for the guest speaker to say, "I need to lose weight. Support me.

" Food, rest and fun are essential elements for guests to leave ready to carry on with their Godgiven work. Stamina is needed to constantly travel. Healthy hospitality helps

Approved Mission Specials Offerings

These offerings are **over and beyond the WEF**. When a local church gives these offerings through the appropriate channels, that church will receive credit toward Ten Percent recognition.

While all Approved Mission Specials are important and have value to the global mission of the church, NMI places a priority on and promotes the following:

Alabaster – typically received in February and September, may be received once or twice a year according to local church preference. For more information click here:
 https://nazarene.org/alabaster Video link: Over 30,000 USD were received in the first offering celebrating Alabaster's 75 years of laying foundations where people worship, heal, and learn. Additional funds were received, but not counted when the total was shared during the Global NMI Convention Click here: to access the video introducing the Alabaster 75th Anniversary celebration, available in English, French, Korean, Portuguese, and Spanish.

Missionary Care – Missionary care is an important strategy of Nazarene Missions International (NMI) to help provide for personal needs of missionaries. For more information click here: https://nazarene.org/who-we-are/organization/ministries/nazarene-missions-international/nmi-links

- These expressions of care include: <u>Links</u>: a strategy for "linking" churches with missionaries through prayer and personal contact.
- Missionary Christmas Fund: provides a monetary Christmas gift for missionaries.
- Missionary Health Care: monies collected through the Memorial Roll and Distinguished Service Award used to subsidize missionary health care costs.
- The Memorial Roll: a way to honor deceased friends and loved ones. A certificate is issued in the name of the person memorialized and is often presented to a family member or displayed in the church.
- Distinguished Service Award: a certificate presented to an individual to recognize outstanding service to God and the church. The presenter (usually a church or district) contributes \$125 to Missionary Health Care.

World Mission Broadcast – Provides electronic media broadcasts of the gospel throughout the world. This offering may be promoted any time the local church may deem best to be most effective. For more information click here: <u>https://nazarene.org/wmb</u>

<u>***Churches may include any of the above offerings in the local budget or in</u> faith promise without receiving an offering.

Other Global Giving --- Non-Ten Percent Giving

- Duty money on packages sent to missionaries
- Postage on LINKS communications and packages
- Items for LINKS (instead of cash)
- Personal gifts to missionaries

Designated Giving is a vehicle for specific Nazarene Missions initiatives. Designated giving (Approved Specials) allows every member to give directly to specific needs within the Nazarene Missions organization as defined by the Church of the Nazarene.

World Evangelism Church of Excellence

Churches that give at least 5.7 percent or an additional \$1,500, whichever is less to WEF. (This giving parallels the former "Award of Excellence.") WEF giving beyond 5.5 percent invests in new world areas and new works in the U.S.A. and Canada.

2024 NAZARENE FAST FACTS

NMI is the global missions advocate in every local church, nurturing a spirit of missions, and mobilizing into action, impacting people around the world.

WE ADVOCATE

Each local NMI president is a member of their local church board who actively participates in the efforts of their local church to ensure that our neighbors know that Jesus loves them.

- The local NMI president also serves as the advocate to encourage their church to participate in ensuring that everyone, living in every place and speaking every language, also knows that Jesus loves them.
 The Church of the Nazarene ministers in 165 world areas with Belgium on the Eurasia Region recognized in 2024.
- The number of Nazarene churches increased to 30,747 churches, with over 2.72 million members, an increase of 2.69% from last year.
- In 2023, there were 472 districts and 30 pioneer areas around the world, with 31,354 credentialed clergy.*

WE NURTURE

NMI nurtures a spirit of missions in the local church, working hand in hand with pastors to ensure that every person in each local church has a deep passion to share Jesus with others in our communities and around the world.

This spirit of missions is so alive it fuels all that we do. We will not stop until everyone, everywhere, has heard the Good News.

WE MOBILIZE

NMI mobilizes into action by focusing on five key areas of impact::

Prayer for the lost

- We encourage people to pray for all missions efforts of the Church of the Nazarene.
- Each week, NMI Central shares prayer requests and praises for a country where the Lord is working through the Church of the Nazarene.

- Since 1996, during the week that includes the first Friday in March, NMI has called the church to prayer through the Global Week of Prayer, with
 resources for adults and children in multiple languages. NAZARENE.ORG/NMIGWP

Engaging children and youth

- We engage children and youth in learning about and participating in the mission of God. We collaborate with NDI and NYI to ensure that all children and youth have a spirit of missions within them.
- NMI provides Kids Kaleidoscope as part of NMI Central to help nurture a spirit of missions in children. Kids Kaleidoscope connects to the focus story in NMI Central the first Wednesday of each month. NAZARENE.ORG/NMI-CENTRAL
- International Student Scholarship Fund (NMI 80th Anniversary project) provided 85 scholarships for students outside the USA/Canada to attend Nazarene theological institutions.

Providing Care and Connection to Nazarene missionaries

- NMI provides care and connection between missionaries and local Churches of the Nazarene.
- All six regions participate in providing Care and Connection between districts and Nazarene missionaries through Links.
- In 2023, there were 482 missionaries originating from 59 world areas, serving in 83 countries. Of these missionaries, 319 served as global deployed and 163 were sponsored deployed. Last year, there were 41 new missionary deployments. Within these missionary families, there are 257 missionary kids.
- Nazarenes gave US \$4.7 million in deputation and missionary support offerings for missionaries.**
- Missionary Health Care provided US \$353,677 in medical assistance for Nazarene missionaries, through offerings, Memorial Roll gifts, and Distinguished Service Award gifts.** • 372 retired missionaries received benefits through the Global Missions Pension Plan for the 2022-2023 fiscal year.*

Giving to World Evangelism Fund

- We inform our churches of the world's need and how the Church of the Nazarene is responding through the World Evangelism Fund. We encourage every church to faithfully participate in giving to the World Evangelism Fund.
- 50 educational institutions, including seven graduate seminaries/theological colleges, 14 liberal arts colleges/universities (13 with graduate programs), 18 undergraduate seminaries/ theological colleges, eight certificate and diploma Bible colleges, two nurses training colleges, one teacher training college, and 1,059 education centers (approved extension centers) had a 2023 combined enrollment of 43,339 students globally.*
- Persons in need were treated at community-based clinics and health care centers all over the world with concentrated efforts in India, Papua New Guinea, and Eswatini (formerly known as Swaziland).*
- JESUS Film Harvest Partners (JFHP), raising \$3.7 million, reports that World Evangelism Fund (WEF) helped provide infrastructure for 1,109 JFHP teams to share God's love through the story of Jesus. In 2023, teams reported over 2.3 million evangelistic contacts. Of these contacts, 699,029 indicated decisions for Christ with 404,511 new believers receiving initial discipleship follow-up. Teams started 11,675 Preaching Points in 2023.
- NMI and others partnered with local churches to help raise US \$37.2 million through the World Evangelism Fund during the 2022-2023 fiscal year.**
- Churches globally gave US \$24.6 million for Nazarene Approved Missions Projects.**
- In 2023, 92 districts gave 5.5 percent or above of their income to the World Evangelism Fund (56 of which were from regions other than the USA/Canada Region). WEF giving beyond 5.5 percent helps open new work, sustains works opened in recent years, and helps send new missionaries that God calls.
- Nazarenes gave US \$210,290 to World Mission Broadcast (WMB), providing radio, television, and Internet programs to share the gospel globally.**
- NMI partnered with Nazarene Compassionate Ministries to give more than US \$5 million for disaster response and compassion projects around the world and to support 10,559 children through Child Development Centers and Pastor's Kids programs.*

Giving to Alabaster

- Churches lay the foundation through Alabaster offerings for places where people worship, heal, and learn by encouraging global
 participation each year. Every Alabaster project is a joint effort of local contribution and labor, combined with global love and
 support in bringing tangible presence and a sense of long-term commitment to a community. No Alabaster funds are used for
 administrative costs.
- Nazarenes gave US \$2.9 million for Alabaster to fund projects in 2023. The Alabaster Offering is used in all six global regions.**
- Over US \$30,000 was raised during the Global NMI Convention in June 2023 at the launch of the 75th anniversary year of Alabaster.
- Often, Alabaster giving goes hand in hand with Nazarene Missions Teams who help build structures funded by Alabaster and the contributions of Nazarene Missions Teams. NMI assisted 374 Nazarene Missions Teams in raising US \$1.3 million for projects.

"New work" refers to new world areas, a geographical area, or new entities such as institutions. Pioneer areas or Phase 1 districts are considered new work. When a district reaches Phase 2, it is no longer a "new work."

WE IMPACT

- NMI supports those called to go and serve as Nazarene missionaries, and NMI provides a place of service for those called to stay and support
 missions through their local church.
- Since 1915, Nazarene Missions International has served Christ and his mission through the Church of the Nazarene in making Christlike disciples in the nations.
- <u>NMI Central</u> is a weekly publication that focuses on a different country each week by telling stories of impact, calling the church to pray for specific requests from the focus country, and offering praise for God's activities through the Church of the Nazarene. NMI Central is free to subscribers and is distributed by email every Wednesday in multiple languages. NAZARENE.ORG/NMI-CENTRAL
- NMI membership is now equal to local church membership. In 2023, there were more than 2.5 million NMI members organized in 28,077 churches around the world.

When we go on a district work & witness trip we must provide "project money"" in advance funds to purchase the materials that will be use for the project we will be working on. The project money can be anywhere from \$10,000.00 up.

****Note: Our W&W projects are registered.

<u>****NOTE We have established the months of March and October as work and witness</u> offering month. We ask that each church send an offering -earmarked "District W&W Project Money".

When a church also gives ten percent of its total income to mission work via donations to the World Evangelism Fund and Mission Specials, the church reaches its Ten Percent goal and is recognized as a Mission 10 church.

Some generous churches contribute more than 10 percent to the shared global mission. These churches receive recognition in five percent increments beyond the Mission 10 status (mission 15, 20, 25, etc.).

- There will be explanation of how we collect these and an explanation of the required check to cover \$15.00 for each box you bring.

Gifts in Kind <u>https://www.ncmi.org/gifts-in-kind</u>

Gifts-in-Kind (GIK) is a type of charitable giving in which, instead of giving money to buy needed goods and services, the goods and services are given. As Christians, we give because sharing with others is at the core of the Gospel.

A GIK shipment involves sending a 40-foot container, and in some instances, a 20-foot container, to Nazarene ministries overseas. The container, loaded with GIK items, is transported by truck to a nearby port, then loaded onto a sea vessel and shipped overseas. Containers can be purchased and will remain in the country of destination to be used by the recipient organization. The recipient organization is called the Consignee.

GIK SHIPPING STANDARDS

As a program, Gifts-in-Kind has earned an excellent reputation with several countries' governments that are skeptical of most donating programs. This program deals with an impressive amount of red tape in clearing shipments with different government's customs offices, but has been successful in building relationships and trust. Because of this reputation, we require high standards of quality of the donated goods. In this section you will find many guidelines we ask that you abide by. Please know this is not to be overly picky, but to convey a message of love to the person who will eventually receive it as a gift from his brothers and sisters in Christ.

We follow the GIK Standards set by Accord (formerly known as AERDO). Accord serves Christian organizations and churches to achieve the highest standards, principles and effectiveness in their relief and development efforts. (<u>Click here to</u> review the Accord GIK Standards)

The Gifts-in-Kind program is one of the many ways we as a church body reach out in compassion to provide hope and help to the needy. It is a program made possible by your donations and willingness to volunteer. Thank you for helping us to be the hands and feet of Jesus around the world.

CRISIS CARE KIT PREPARATION SEE REVISED LIST LINK AT END OF DOCUMENT

- Gather NEW items in quantities listed below. Assemble Crisis Care Kits (CCKs) and seal the Ziploc bags. Include only those items listed below. Deviating from this list can cause an entire shipment to be rejected in customs. Set the CCKs in groups of six (6) to determine the number of banana boxes needed.
- 2. Pack contents below into a clear 2-gallon OR 2.5-gallon plastic Ziploc bag and seal:
 - -1 medium-size bottle of shampoo (12-18 oz.), please tape flip-tops closed
 - -2 bars of soap (bath-size or larger)
 - -1 medium toothpaste (4.0-6.4 oz.)
 - -3 toothbrushes (in original packaging)
 - -1 box of Band-Aids (30 or more)
 - -1 fingernail clipper
 - -1 sturdy hair comb
 - -2 hand towels
 - -4 pocket-size packages of facial tissue
 - -1 Beanie Baby-size stuffed toy
- 3. Obtain the banana boxes from your local grocery store. Please ship CCKs solely in banana boxes, as they provide uniformity, eliminating wasted space in shipping.
- 4. Cut the heavy brown paper (usually found in the banana box) in half and place inside the bottom of the box. Tape the other half over the hole in the lid. (Plain cardboard may be used in the same way if your banana boxes are missing the paper.)
- 5. Fill each box with six (6) CCKs—no more, no less.
- 6. **Do not insert money or literature** (including anything with the church's name on it, notes, etc.) in the CCKs or banana boxes.
- 7. Using strong packing tape, cover all holes in the top and the bottom of the box. Then tape the box securely shut. Please leave box handles open; this makes it easier to load and unload.
- 8. When addressing the box, please put the name and address of the church (or individual donor) on the box in the "From" section and the address of the warehouse in the "To" section.
- 9. **Do not wrap banana boxes** in brown paper or contact paper or put filled banana boxes inside another box.
- 10. Bring the boxes to our MAC (District Convention) and the boxes and required check will be collected at the appointed collection point and time.
- 11. Bring a check from your church: Make your check payable to NC District NMI and "Earmark it CCKs/SPPs":

The check must be presented to those collecting the boxes to cover \$15.00 for each CCK box you bring to the district MAC (District Convention)

- <u>The \$15.00 covers the following</u>: The 12.00 storage fee required by the warehouse that helps ship these boxes anywhere in the world as needed and \$3.00 helps cover the district cost of delivering the boxes to the warehouse.
- Include the **name and address of your church** with the check.
 - Our treasurer will write one check for the storage fee and send a list of the churches that participated. <u>Ten Percent Credit will be allowed for the \$12.00</u> shipping donation only. Do not put the money in the CCKs or banana boxes.

SCHOOL PAL-PAK PREPARATION

- 1. Gather **NEW** items in quantities listed below. Assemble School Pal-Paks (SPPs) and seal the Ziploc bags. Include only those items listed below. Deviating from this list can cause an entire shipment to be rejected in customs. Set the SPPs in groups of ten (10) to determine the number of boxes needed.
- 2. Pack contents below in a clear 1-gallon Ziploc bag and seal:

-2 composition notebooks (such as Mead brand), no larger than 9¾"x -7½". (No spiral-bound notebooks will be accepted.)

-package of #2 pencils (quantity—10-12 pencils)

-package of black pens (quantity—10-12 pens)

-pink erasers, 2-3" long

-rulers (6" or 12", with metric measurements)

-package of colored pencils (quantity-12-15)

-pair of blunt-nosed scissors

-hand-held pencil sharpener

These contents will give each student a notebook, 5-6 pencils, 5-6 pens, an eraser, and a ruler. Two students will share the colored pencils, scissors, and sharpener.

- Obtain 12"x12"x12" boxes from any office supply store such as Office Depot, Office Max, Staples, or a UPS store.
- 4. Fill each box with **10 Pal-Paks—no more, no less**.
- 5. **Do not insert money or literature** (including anything with the church's name on it, notes, etc.) in the Pal-Paks or boxes.
- 6. Using strong packing tape, tape the box securely shut.
- 7. When addressing the box, please put the name and address of the church (or the individual donor) on the box in the "From" section and the address of the warehouse in the "To" section.
- 8. Do not wrap boxes in brown paper or contact paper or put fi lled boxes inside another box.
- 9. Bring a check from your church: Make your check payable to NC District NMI and "Earmark it CCKs/SPPs":

The check must be presented to those collecting the boxes to cover \$15.00 for each box you bring to the district MAC (District Convention)

- The \$15.00 covers the following: The 10.00 storage fee for SPP required by the warehouse that helps ship these boxes anywhere in the world as needed and \$5.00 helps cover the district cost of delivering the boxes to the warehouse.
- Include the name and address of your church with the check.
 - Our treasurer will write one check for the storage fee and send a list of the churches that participated. <u>Ten Percent Credit will be allowed for the \$12.00</u> <u>shipping donation only.</u> Do not put the money in the CCKs or banana boxes.

Standards and Goals 2024-2025

It is important that the Nazarene Missions International (NMI) work effectively in helping to carry out the Great Commission. Standards and Goals can help keep us moving in the right direction. Standards set up a rule for measuring. Goals encourage reaching ahead. May we strive to meet and exceed the goals established this year for God's eternal glory.

We, your committee on Standards and Goals, recommend the following:

I. Each local church has an organized Nazarene Missions International

A. Enroll all church members participating in the mission program of the local church as active members and enroll as associate members those people who are currently active in the mission program of the local church but are not members of the local congregation.

II. B. Create a mission's event in your local church for children and teens for local missions and foreign missions.

C. Elect a local Work and Witness coordinator and participate in district Work and Witness projects and, if possible, plan a Work and Witness trip from your local church.

D. Elect or appoint a Mission Call Director who actively seeks out, encourages, and gives purposeful direction to children, youth who feel there is a possible call of God on their lives for missionary service. This Director will report the names and contact information for such individuals to the District Mission Call Director and the local pastor. (District Mission Call Coordinator is Bettyanna Bremmer)

Each church pays its World Evangelism Fund (WEF) in full and strives to earn the Award of Excellence.

A. This is achieved through accomplishing one or a combination of the following:

1. Thanksgiving Offering

- 2. Easter Offering
- 3. Prayer and Fasting Offering
- 4. Faith Promise Offering
- 5. Any offering designated as WEF Offering

B. Award of Excellence: overpay the WEF by 3% or \$1,000.00 (whichever is less)

MISSION PRIORITY ONE PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Prayer-The church will pray for missions.
- 2. Global Awareness- The church will use mission's resources and participate in activities to develop global awareness.
- 3. Children and Youth- the church will provide opportunity for its children and youth to experience missions and to respond to God's call.
- 4. Giving- The church will pay World Evangelism fund in full.

III. Each local church fulfills the following financial responsibilities:

A. Pay the North Carolina District budget in full

B. Send in LINKS offering by September 30 (we are the only District assigned to our LINKS missionaries for one year)

C. Participate in the Medical Plan through:

- 1. Memorial Roll
- 2. Distinguished Service Award
- 3. Special Medical Plan Offering in May
- 4. Gifts from the Heart

D. Participate in World Evangelism Broadcast Offering (June emphasis)

E. Participate in the Alabaster offering (September and February)

F. Participate in the Compassionate Ministries Offering (December emphasis)

G. Participate in the District Work and Witness Project Offering (April emphasis)

H. Participate in the Nazarene District Disaster Response Offering (October emphasis) (This offering goes toward NDR for our district as we participate in helping in areas affected by a disaster.)

- 1. Project Money goes entirely for materials/supplies to be used on the specific work assignment of the Work and Witness trip.
- 2. Mail to District NMI Treasurer by end of April in order to help fund the Project Money for the District Work and Witness trips each year.
- 3. That each church considers when providing its Work & Witness Project offerings the fact that the General church requires a minimum of \$10,000.00 per Work & Witness Project and that generally North Carolina attempts to have two District Work & Witness trips per year.
- 4. The district encourages each church to have a local mission/ missional area project each year. (The district will try to have one a year when possible)

H. If possible, each local church will host or co-host a missionary speaker each year and provide Deputation Offering in line with General NMI Handbook and Constitution recommendations. The following minimum offering scale is recommended:

- 1. Sunday Morning Service...... \$400-500
- 2. Sunday Evening Service.....\$250-\$350
- 3. Weekday Service..... \$225-\$325
- 4. Faith Promise Convention......\$700-No limit
- 5. District NMI Convention.....\$1,000.00

IV. Each local church finds a way to give 10% of the total church income to World Evangelism. Recognizing the impact that churches around the world have found by using Faith Promise giving as one of the most effective and powerful way to raise this WEF completely and even overpay it, every church is encouraged to at least try the method of Faith Promise to raise WEF and 10% giving.

V. Each local church achieves Mission Priority One Award and North Carolina Honor Society status.

PROCEDURES THAT WILL AID AND ASSIST THE LOCAL CHURCH IN REACHING ALL GOALS

- Participation by each church in an organized PRAYER and fasting program a. Utilizing the Prayer Mobilization Line by Internet by clicking here b. Join our district Facebook page by logging on to your Facebook account and then typing NC District NMI
- 2. Promotion of mission education. Utilize the calendar of Emphasis links for more information to share with your local church. For this year we encourage churches to purchase and read the two books we mentioned.
- 3. Annual subscription and reading of the Holiness Today magazine by every church family
- 4. Use of the current NMI Handbook.
- 5. Quarterly meetings of the Local NMI Council for planning, promotion and evaluation
- 6. Participation in available workshops, Missional Area, District and Southeast Regional meetings.
- 7. If possible, mission education shall be accomplished through monthly local NMI meetings promoting the monthly calendar emphasis, prayer and mission study. Use of a variety of mission education resources is recommended: mission education curriculum now named Living Mission, videos, deputation speakers, dramas, etc. Remember that the curriculum is only a guide and resource and does not have to be covered in detail monthly in order to accomplish true mission education in the local church. We encourage the freedom of each local NMI to provide exciting, interesting, innovative mission education in whatever forum works best for each local congregation. We encourage the regular use of mission spots in Sunday services to reach the greatest number of people.
- 8. Look for mission opportunities in your community, Ex: Salvation Army, Local homeless shelter.

When a natural disaster strikes, Nazarene Disaster Response provides a way for local Nazarene churches to respond with assistance and resources for the community in need.

Our vision is to empower Nazarenes to respond to their community in practical and tangible ways in any instance of disaster.

What is NDR? Nazarene Disaster Response (NDR) Unlike other, large disaster response agencies (FEMA, the Red Cross), NDR relies on our churches and volunteers for effective disaster response. Is shorthand for the work of disaster preparedness, response, and recovery in the USA/Canada region. Under the jurisdiction of Nazarene Compassionate Ministries, NDR supports local churches and districts when they are affected by natural or man-made disasters. Training for disaster preparedness and response, mobilizing volunteers and experienced response teams during a crisis, and providing support in long term recovery efforts are among some of NDR's activities.

What does NDR do? Unlike other, large disaster response agencies (FEMA, the Red Cross), NDR relies on our churches and volunteers for effective disaster response. Our goal is to enable them—with training, leadership, relationships, and logistics—to serve each other and the world. In preparation for disasters, NDR hosts trainings, supports preparedness and mitigation activities, and maintains a database of active volunteers and experienced team leaders. During an active disaster response, NDR can provide support for mobilizing volunteers, funding for response activities, technical expertise and advice during complex emergencies, and coordination of work designed to recovery quickly from the impact of a disaster. Because we

work through our churches, we have the capacity to assist those impacted for the long term. NDR and NCM prioritize long term recovery programs designed to promote the well being of those affected, rather than more narrowly focusing only on immediate response.

What happens during disaster response? When a disaster occurs in the USA/Canada region, Nazarene Compassionate Ministries staff reaches out to the affected District Superintendents to assess the impact to our communities and congregations. These assessments sometimes indicate a significant impact that requires the church to be active in the recovery. During those times, NCM staff works with the district leaders to determine the scope of the response and how much assistance is needed. NCM will communicate to the broader church the need for funding, items, or volunteers, and will work with the Districts as they develop their plans.

Does NDR accept volunteers? You can volunteer by responding in your local community to a natural disaster; by preparing your church for disaster readiness and response; by joining an NDR project as a volunteer, or by receiving training and developing a church or district response team. <u>NazServe.org</u> is a volunteer database that was developed in part to match up volunteers with NDR projects. Registering on the site is the best way to begin the volunteer process. You can also search for current projects.

Can my church get involved in NDR?

Churches can create plans to prepare themselves for disasters and organize teams or encourage parishioners to sign up as NDR volunteers. If there is a nearby disaster, churches can reach out to victims and partner with local organizations who are responding. Churches can also host outside volunteers, assemble crisis care kits if requested, and operate as shelters for displaced people.

How is money I donate to NDR used to help victims of disaster? Money is sent to a central account, and is disbursed by request to churches or districts affected by disaster. Although NDR exists to serve all people (not just Nazarenes), only Nazarene entities are given funds for disaster response and rehabilitation. Funds for disaster response are typically spent on basic needs (food, water, and shelter), assisting with cleanup costs and debris removal, supporting skilled NDR teams in the field, and responding to the direct needs of those affected.

Do donations to NDR count as 10% mission special giving? Yes they do. To learn about 10% Specials, visit <u>Stewardship Ministries Page</u>.

What can I donate besides money? In all disasters, the most useful and efficient way to contribute is to directly volunteer with or donate money to a trusted organization. Unless items are specifically needed and requested (clothing, hygiene items, constriction materials, or any other miscellaneous items), please do not send them!
